

**Local School Ready to Meet Challenges of New School Year**

St. Michael Parish School Prepared for the Journey of the 2011-2012 School Year

**August 16, 2011– Wheaton, Illinois** – On August 23, St. Michael School will officially open its doors to students, marking the beginning of a new school year.

While the Catholic School is not immune to the challenges presented by the current economy, the administration is pleased that heading into the 2010-2011 school year there have been no program cuts, an all-day Kindergarten option has been added permanently, and a large space has been renovated to accommodate the preschool program.

St. Michael Parish School competes promisingly in both academics and athletics. This year will be no exception. Football and cross country teams begin practices in August. Girls' volleyball try-outs will take place at the start of the school year. On the academic field, students look forward to competing locally, regionally and even perhaps nationally in this year's Spelling Bee, Science Fair and National Geographic Bee.

The 2011-2012 school year also marks the beginning of two new teachers at St. Michael Parish School.

In second grade, the school is pleased to welcome Mrs. Janet Ray. Mrs. Ray has 12 years of experience teaching both pre-school and first grade at St. Mary's Catholic School in West Chicago. She possesses a Masters of Arts in Reading and is currently pursuing her Reading Specialist Certification through the State of Illinois. Her references, which include parents of her students, teachers, and administrators, describe Janet as extremely dedicated, competent, capable, and compassionate teacher who understands the development of the whole child. One parent who is a former teacher writes, "I found Mrs. Ray to be one of the most professional, experienced, and intelligent elementary school teachers I have known. She managed her classroom with kindness and respect for children, parents, and colleagues."

Mrs. Kristin Kuehn was selected to instruct the school's new All Day Kindergarten program. Mrs. Kuehn is a National Board Certified Teacher, an exceptional find, as it means that she has successfully completed a voluntary assessment program designed to recognize effective and accomplished teachers who meet high standards. She has 9 years of experience teaching All Day Kindergarten, as well as a Masters of Arts in Education. Her references, which include parents of her students, teachers, and administrators, describe Kristin as a career primary educator who loves children, who raises the bar of student achievement across all ability and developmental levels, and who does so with a Christian, professional, and positive spirit. 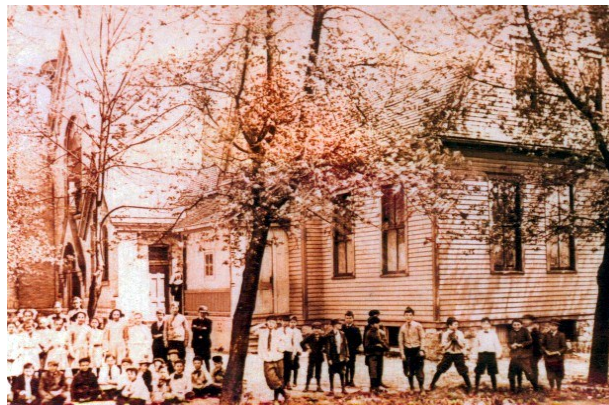
# BACKGROUND

## Opening Doors for Children Since 1882

Construction on the first Wheaton Catholic Church was finalized on May 29, 1882. Immediately classrooms were established in the basement for the purpose of instruction the children of the parish. The School Sisters of St. Francis taught the classes to these children. The Pastor lived in the basement of the church.



Unfortunately in 1911 the church was severely burned. However, faithful parishioners salvaged wood from the old mission church and used it to build a frame school building. By the early 1920's, the parishioners were convinced that a more sturdy school building was needed for their children. In October of 1923, the oldest section of the present building was completed.



In the early to mid forties every available space of the building was put to use. A section of the third floor was used as a gym, and movies were shown in the projection room which is the present attic of this portion of the building.

By the late fifties and early sixties, the Catholic population of Wheaton had grown significantly. Once again, the parishioners added another addition to the school. This is presently the middle section of the building, which contains first and second grade on the first floor, and Junior High on the second. During these years, the School Sisters of St. Francis staffed St. Michael School. In the late sixties, it became necessary for them to leave this ministry at St. Michael. For a few years, the school administrator was a lay person. In the fall of 1974, under the influence of Bishop Blanchette of Joliet Diocese, the Sisters of Notre Dame from Toledo Ohio, came to be part of the educational system of St. Michael School. Over the years, a number of Sisters had been a part of St. Michael School's educational staff.

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Continuous progress has been made over the years. In the seventies, once again, St. Michael Parish School was experiencing an increase in enrollment. At that time, the physical education classes were held in the old church building and in the basement. Before long, plans were made for adding another section onto the already existing building. This section, which is the present office area, gym, and parish center, was complete by the Fall of 1985.

As ever new and improved educational trends evolved over the years, St. Michael Parish School added a curriculum for Kindergartners in 1975. A program for four-year olds was added in 1997 and three-year olds in 1998.

At each turning point in the history of St. Michael Parish School, faithful, generous parishioners have supported the expansions and progress of our School. As we continue to move through the next millennium, we are proud to carry on the Catholic tradition of spreading the Good News of Jesus that was initiated by our fore bearers more than one hundred and twenty-five years ago. Now, as then, we continue to provide our students with an academic curriculum that equips them to enter the future with pride in their Catholic heritage and skills to meet the needs of the times.



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# BIOGRAPHY

## **Reverend Don E. McLaughlin**

### **Pastor, St. Michael Catholic Church**



In 2002, Fr. Don McLaughlin, a self-professed 'simple parish priest, found himself in the midst of upheaval, as just nine months after assuming his role as pastor of St. Michael Parish the church building burned to the ground.

Fielding media inquiries, counseling parishioners, and working with the Joliet Diocese and other faith communities, he eventually led the church "out of the ashes," dedicating a new church in March 2006. Throughout the 4-year building project, Fr. McLaughlin successfully balanced the demands of overseeing a \$13 million capital campaign with his equally important pastoral duties.

Fr. Don E. McLaughlin began his theological studies in 1977 and was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Joseph Imesch in Joliet, Illinois on October 10, 1981. Prior to his priestly ordination, he served as a deacon at St. Margaret Mary Church in Naperville from 1981-1982. He was also assigned as an Associate Pastor at St. Alexander, Villa Park (1982-1985), St. Philip, Addison (1985-1989), St. Walter, Roselle (1989-1990), and St. Charles Borromeo (1990-1993).

In 1993, he was named parochial administrator of St. Charles Borromeo, and later that year was named pastor, where he served until June 2001.

In October 2006, Fr. McLaughlin celebrated the 25th anniversary of his priesthood at St. Michael Church. Members of many of the parishes in which he had served came to the Wheaton church to celebrate this milestone.

The mission to "build Church" has been driven by Fr. McLaughlin. During 2010, Fr. McLaughlin made a promise to bring people back to church and build community among parishioners and with St. Michael Church through special initiatives such as the neighborhood masses in parishioner homes. These services deepened the personal connection with parishioners and interested members of the local community.

In the 2010-2011 fiscal year, Fr. McLaughlin will work to move St. Michael to the next level in connecting with parishioners and building a culture of true stewardship.

Principal, Mrs. Marcia Opal, has proudly run St. Michael Parish School since 2006. Leading the school of approximately 600 students and 60 staff members, encompassing grades preschool through eight, she has demonstrated her commitment to learning, leadership and excellence.

Principal Opal has also promoted continued learning for her staff and created leadership opportunities.

During her time at St. Michael, Opal has also worked with administrative committees to enhance the physical environment of St. Michael Parish School; generating funds for the completion of a conveyance system, an outdoor play space and classroom, a library learning center and updated technology.

A curriculum expert, Mrs. Opal is an Adjunct Professor of Curriculum and Instruction at Lewis University. She currently serves on several diocesan committees focused on Catholic education. Additionally, Mrs. Opal has been instrumental in the development of the diocesan teacher evaluation system. St. Michael Parish also enjoys her service as an Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharistic.

Before coming to St. Michael Parish School, Mrs. Opal was the Assistant Principal of Benjamin Franklin Elementary School in Glen Ellyn for 5 years. She also brings to the table 20 years of classroom experience, having taught preschool and kindergarten, in addition to first, second and fifth grades. Mrs. Opal holds an M.A in Curriculum and Administration from National Lewis University, as well as an M.A. in School Administration from the Northern Illinois University. She is certified to teach at all grade levels.

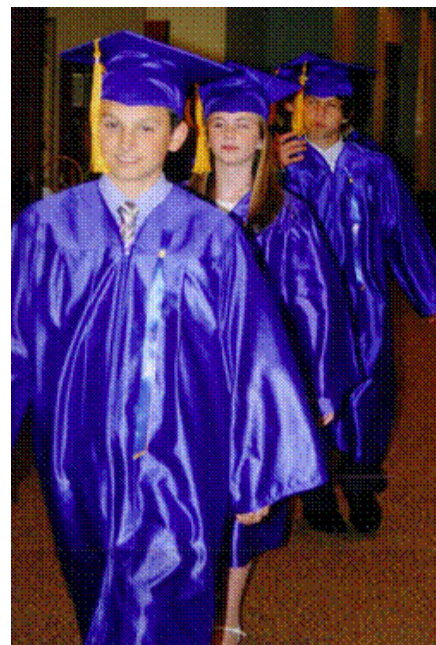

## ST. MICHAEL PARISH SCHOOL NOTABLE ALUMNI

**1941- Arthur Armbrust – Father, Friend, Fan, and Philanthropist** – Mr. Armbrust began working with his father, Clarence, in the Wheaton-based plumbing business. Art Armbrust started in 1918 and eventually took over Armbrust Plumbing. Among his contributions to the city of Wheaton was his service on the Wheaton Park District Board of Commissioners and the Wheaton Public Library Board. In 1984, The St. Michael School sports program gave him an award for his selfless dedication from 1956 – 1984, during which he helped organize and establish the DuPage Parochial League. In 1988, St. Francis High School saluted Mr. Armbrust for “22 years of caring services to the SFHS Community.”

**1959 – Margaret Patterson- Daughter of the First St. Michael School Lay Teacher** - Ms. Patterson, returns to the school yearly to share with students stories and artifacts from their school’s history. Ms. Patterson also recently planned her class’ fiftieth class reunion, which was very well-attended.

**1961- Bill Cashin – Thirty-Eight-Year Veteran Teacher at St. Michael School** – In his time at St. Michael, Mr. Cashin has answered calls to teach religion as well as coach various sports. He has also given his time and talent to the St. Michael community as a teacher in the St. Michael Religious Education program, a Lector and Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist. In 2002, the gymnasium at St. Michael School was named the ‘Cashin Gym’ to honor Mr. Cashin for giving St. Michael 30 years of his devoted service.

**1962 – Anne Cahill – Researcher** - As an associate professor at the University of Chicago, Ms. Cahill does researcher in the field of neurology.

**1966 and 1994 - Dr. Dennis Beck, DDS and Dr. Nicole Beck Rodgers, DDS – Father / Daughter Dental Team** - Dr. Beck has been a part of the Wheaton community his entire life. He’s a graduate of Loyola University Chicago, and he followed in his father’s footsteps to obtain his DDS degree from Loyola University in 1982. Since then he has served the residents of Wheaton as well as patients from many surrounding communities. Dr. Beck is an active member of the Chicago, Illinois & American Dental Societies. Dr. Beck is known for his excellent skill, second only to his caring manner. He deeply values the patients who have chosen to be a part of his practice.

Dr. Rodgers graduated from Northwestern University undergraduate followed by the University of Illinois at Chicago with her DDS degree in 2007. **1984 – John Messitt - Hollywood Jack of Trades** – Mr. Messitt works as a Director of Photography/Camera Operator. Some of his Notable Projects include Campus Ladies, Bones and American Idol. Mr. Messitt also serves as the 1st Vice President of The Society of Camera Operators. Jack will be directing his first movie this summer – Midnight Movie - a horror film. He co-wrote the screenplay and named a character after his favorite teacher at St. Michael, Mr. Cashin.

**1984- Ron Severino - Physician and Charity Director** – Dr. Severino is a family physician at Cornerstone Medical Group in Wheaton. Ron also works at Central DuPage Hospital serving presently as chairman of the Family Medicine department. Ron and his wife, Liz, have created a charity, Frankie's Fund, to help meet the needs of children with special needs.

**1984 – James Sugrue - Business Leader** – Mr. Sugrue works as Senior Corporate Counsel Sega's head office. He is Senior Corporate Counsel for the Sega Corporation, Tokyo, Japan.

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**1986 - Dan Proft** – *Conservative Thought Leader and WLS Talk Show Host* - A gubernatorial candidate in Illinois' 2010 Republican Primary, Dan is currently the Principal member of Starfish Consulting, a public relations firm in Chicago, a respected political commentator and host for WLS-AM 890 radio in Chicago, as well as a contributor to Human Events, School Reform News, and other conservative publications. Mr. Proft is a regular guest on local and national public affairs shows where he has tackled a wide range of local, national and international public policy issues. Among his civic pursuits, Dan serves as President of the Illinois chapter of Operation Homefront, a non-profit organization whose mission is to provide assistance to military families, particularly those with a spouse serving overseas. He is also the volunteer spokesman for the Choose Life License Plate initiative, designed to fund adoption-service providers through the sale of specialty license plates in Illinois.

**1990, 1993, and 1997 - Dan Traver, David Traver and Tim Traver** – *Brothers and Philanthropists* – The Traver family founded a charity in the name of their late mother, Dorothy. **1991- Michael Serio and the Serio Family** – *Inspiration and 'One Love' Advocate* – Michael Serio passed away at age 32 on January 24, 2009. At the time of his passing, Michael worked as a Vice President at Santa Barbara Bank & Trust. In their grief, the Serio family made the decision to gift memorial contributions to St. Michael School's tuition assistance fund, which helps families who have children currently attending the school and have financial difficulties that might jeopardize their children's enrollment in the school. Michael's mother, Regina Carlson, said of the decision, "There is no place that established a more solid foundation in the education and faith of my six children than St. Michael. It was with the help of the Parish and such funds that they were all able to finish at St. Michael, so it was fitting that this is where donations would go." The Serio Family has vowed to continue fundraising for the school in Michael's name.

**1992 – Todd Scalzo** – *Community Leader and Lawyer* – Mr. Scalzo was elected to the Wheaton City Council in April, 2009. He has been practicing law at Scalzo Law offices in Wheaton since 2004. Todd is also a member of Wheaton Chamber of Commerce, DuPage County Bar Association (Vice-Chair, Local Governance Committee), DuPage Justinian Society of Italian-American Lawyers (Seated Vice-President), Rotary Club of Central DuPage, Drake Terrace Condo Association (President), St. Michael Church and the Wheaton Sports Center.

**1993 - Maggie Messitt** – *Journalist and Humanitarian* – Ms. Messitt lives in South Africa. She is a narrative journalist and the Founding Director of Amazwi, a literary publication that supports impoverished African women. Additionally, Ms. Messitt is one of the founding directors for the Amazwi (a Zulu word meaning "voices") School of Media Arts, in South Africa. The school produces a literary publication "The Voice".

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**1993 - Anjali Raja – Scholar and Researcher-** Ms. Raja is a Fulbright Scholar. She earned her Ph.D. at the University of Toronto and is currently a researcher in the area of Neuropsychology at the University of Chicago.

**1998 - Robbie Miller – Congressional Medal of Honor Recipient –** Mr. Miller died on January 25, 2008, in service to his country during a firefight near a border town in northeast Afghanistan. During the battle, Sgt. Miller drew enemy fire to himself, saving the lives of his fellow soldiers and Afghan Nationals. Miller joined the military shortly after high school and became a Green Beret in 2005. The following year, Miller's Special Forces detail was deployed to Afghanistan along the Pakistani border. Following his death, St. Michael Parish dedicated the Robert M. Miller Memorial Plaza, located at the northeast corner of the property, in honor of all those who are serving or have served in the Armed Forces. At the dedication ceremony, U.S. Rep. Peter Roskam stated, "He was someone who stood in the gap for us so we could have the freedom to worship here together. And friends, that is a great gift." Sgt. Miller was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor posthumously on October 6, 2010.

**2000 – Colleen Murphy – Event Organizer and Student Leader –** Ms. Murphy was serving as president of the Northern Illinois University Campus Activities Board on February 14, 2008, when a gunman opened fire in a lecture hall, killing 5 students and injuring many more. She began working immediately to help her fellow students heal by organizing a Candlelight vigil on Greek Row the same night. Over 400 students attended the vigil. On April 16, 2008, Virginia Tech held an anniversary ceremony to remember the students whose lives were lost when a gunman went on a rampage through their campus. Colleen was selected, along with students who had been in the NIU lecture hall, to represent Northern Illinois University at that anniversary ceremony.

**2001- Amy Nemeth – Humanitarian and Activist -** While a senior at Loyola University, Ms. Nemeth was involved with the student organization, Invisible Conflicts, which educates the community about conflicts in the world that are ignored by Western media and governments by screening documentaries on campus and bringing speakers to the University. In 2006, Amy helped the organization start an education program in N. Uganda, East Africa. The Dwon Madiki Partnership sponsors the educations of 20 war and AIDS orphans. Amy worked with Invisible Conflicts to partner with an organization that sponsors 80 children affected by war in the Democratic Republic of Congo. ## FEATURED ALUMNI

*On January 25 2008, Robbie Miller, SMS Class of 1998 was killed in a fire-fight in Afghanistan. On May 23, 2008, St. Michael Church and School held a special Memorial Day dedication ceremony to honor Sgt. Miller and all St. Michael parishioners and alumni who have or are serving in the military. Miller was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor on October 6, 2010. The same day, Rob Miller's sacrifice was memorialized in a prayer service at St. Michael School.*

### **Duty. Valor. Honor.**

*Inside the terrifying firefight that revealed what kind of soldier — and man — Wheaton's Rob Miller was.*

U.S. Special Forces along the Kunar River in mountainous northeast Afghanistan had learned that insurgents were running a military compound nearby. Rob Miller, a weapons specialist from Wheaton, was going to help knock it out.

The official objective of his team's patrol on Jan. 25, 2008, was "to confirm or deny enemy activity." But the team — the eight Special Forces guys and 10 to 15 Afghan National Army soldiers — expected a nasty firefight at the very least.

"If I get killed on this mission," Miller said to his friend Staff Sgt. Nick McGarry a few hours before the patrol, "I

don't want to be remembered for dying. I want to be remembered for who I was."

What Miller showed that morning about who he was will be recognized Wednesday at the White House, where President Barack Obama will posthumously award Miller the Medal of Honor, the nation's highest award for military valor. He will be the seventh service member so honored from the Iraq and Afghanistan wars.

The second of eight kids, Miller, 24, was a driven staff sergeant who seemed destined for his fateful mission from the time he took his first steps at 7 months old. As a Boy Scout, he was thrilled to go camping and hiking. In eighth grade, he wrote a poem about the valor of the Army in World War II. In high school, he was a star gymnast, played sousaphone in the Wheaton North marching band, loved Hemingway and deep-dish pizza and was grateful for the D he got in Latin. The owner of the gym where Miller worked trusted him with keys to the place when Miller was 16. His homecoming date said she never felt more secure than when he was with her.

Leadership was an ability that Chad Downie, Miller's high school gymnastics coach and English teacher, watched evolve in Miller. The boy was an extraordinarily intense high school gymnast, recalled Downie. An all-conference performer who competed on varsity as a sophomore, Miller finished his senior year as team captain and one of the state's top 10 gymnasts in a couple of routines.

"I think through high school, Rob was trying to find out what kind of a man he was going to be," Downie said. An ardent student of military history with a powerful mind, Miller became an avid reader and was particularly taken by Ernest Hemingway's hero characters, Downie said.

That typical hero embraces an acute awareness of death, honor, courage, of speaking through one's actions and struggling with misfortune. He even suggests that courting death teaches one how to live. What matters most to the Hemingway hero is facing death with courage and grace.

"I saw him develop into a leader who put his actions ahead of his words," Downie said. His standards were very high, Downie recalled, and if you didn't meet those standards, "he could be a very difficult person." That trait occasionally irked teammates.

"Rob wasn't a difficult guy to get along with," he said. "He was a very gregarious person if you gave him the time to be. But if you were involved in gymnastics ... he really wanted to have a great team, and he held everyone up to that standard."

He also chose the slogan for the team T-shirts one year from Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar": "Cowards die many times before their deaths; the valiant never taste of death but once."





### Art Armbrust (Class of 1941)



St. Michael School Alumnus, **Arthur A. Armbrust**, father of seven and friend to hundreds, died on Thursday, June 25, 2009 after decades of service to the many communities to which he was connected. A funeral Mass celebrating his life will be held on Monday, June 29th at noon at St. Michael's Church in Wheaton, where he was baptized 81 years ago.

Born in Wheaton in 1927, he attended St. Michael's grammar school, Wheaton High School, Morningside College in Sioux City, Iowa and Arizona State University in Tempe. After marrying Vada Doyle of Glen Ellyn in 1951, he began working with his father Clarence in the Wheaton-based plumbing business the elder Armbrust started in 1918. Despite living a life of significant accomplishment, the roles he cherished most were as father, friend, fan and philanthropist.

His life was full of achievement, centered on giving to others. Some of his many civic contributions were publicly recognized. In March of 1971 the Wheaton Park District Board of Commissioners passed a resolution that said, in part, "When the life and times of Arthur Armbrust are recorded surely the past six years of service to the Wheaton Park District will be listed as one of his most rewarding contributions."

One of the awards he most appreciated was becoming Rotary International's first "Mr. Four-Way Test" award recipient in 1973 for service to the school and business community.

He thought Rotary's four-way test was the credo to a life lived well, demanding one to ask of one's actions and activities:

- Is it the truth?
- Is it fair to all concerned?
- Will it build goodwill and better friendships?
- Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

He served on the Wheaton Public Library Board from 1974 – 1977. The St. Michael's school sports program gave him an award for his selfless dedication from 1956 – 1984, during which he helped organize and establish the DuPage Parochial League. In 1988 St. Francis High School saluted him for "22 years of caring services to the SFHS Community."

Next to the ever-present support of his family, he was a relentless supporter of the underprivileged and underappreciated, reaching out to the disabled and those discriminated against. As an upperclassman at Morningside College in the late '40's, he organized the back-to-school dance to welcome George Allen as the school's new head football coach. When he learned that the dance hall he had rented would not allow the African Americans from the football team and school to attend, Mr. Armbrust changed venues and found a hall that was open to all.

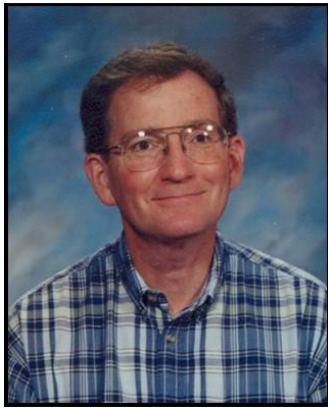
He died at the age of 81 in the family room of his home in the company of his wife Vada and his seven children. Art Armbrust, lifelong resident of Wheaton, adopted son of Cedar City, Utah, a man for all seasons and people.

He is survived by his wife of 57 years, Vada (Doyle) Armbrust, 7 children and 30 grandchildren. He is also survived by his sister Betty Sonnek and numerous brothers-in-law and sisters-in-law.

He was preceded in death by his parents Clarence and Clara Armbrust.



### Bill Cashin (Class of 1961)



St. Michael Parish School's First Annual Bill Cashin Classic Basketball Tournament made its debut over the 2011 Martin Luther King holiday weekend. Alumni and current families were to stop by and cheer on fifth through eighth grade boys' and girls' basketball, as the school honors Bill Cashin, a 39 year veteran teacher.

The tournament began at the Central Athletic Center, and concluded with eight championship games taking place at St. Michael Parish School. Additionally, a fundraiser, benefitting the St. Michael Parish School basketball program was held at The Bank Restaurant in downtown Wheaton. The fundraiser was very well-attended.

Organizers stated on the event webpage, "[There is a quote that says], 'When God measures a man, he puts the tape around his heart.' Rarely does one meet a person whose impact can be felt for a lifetime. Bill Cashin is that person. [We are inviting families and alumni to] support the Classic and St. Michael School, a school he has believed in and worked for the past thirty-nine years."

#### **About Bill Cashin**

The following appeared in St. Michael Parish School's Alumni Newsletter:

"As we received our elementary school diplomas, we were secure in the knowledge that we were fit for high school. Years of diagramming sentences, journalism projects, spelling bees, math timed tests, and (of course) Science Fairs, had prepared us for most of the academic rigors the next four years would throw at us.

What we didn't know, but would come to understand, was that we were also fit for life beyond those four years. We were fit to compete fairly in any arena we chose to enter; to lead and to serve, both by example; to help those who were struggling, and to accept help when we struggled; to demonstrate good sportsmanship; and to step up when we were called.

Over the past 39 years, one of the teachers who has worked diligently and effectively to build fitness of value, work ethic, and spirituality in every student has been Bill Cashin.

'Mr. C' has used physical education to teach thousands of students, not just about sports, but about how to be a member of any team. He has worked diligently to build character and confidence in his students.

After graduating St. Michael School in 1961, Bill Cashin went on to graduate from St. Francis High School in Wheaton, and Loras College, where he majored in Physical Education. In 1972, Bill Cashin began his career teaching Physical Education at St. Michael Parish School.

Over the years, Mr. Cashin has answered calls to teach religion, as well as to coach various sports teams. He has also given his time and talent to the St. Michael community as a teacher in the Religious Education program, a lector and a Eucharistic Minister.

St. Michael Parish School believes that its many talented and dedicated teachers are the reason the school is so strong, and because of teachers like Bill Cashin every student graduates fit for life."



**Michael Vivoda (Class of 1974)**



In April 2001, Michael V. Vivoda, of Wheaton, was appointed president of Central DuPage Hospital (CDH), in Winfield, Ill. He previously held the title of executive vice president. Former president and CEO, Luke McGuinness, has transitioned into the CEO role of the newly formed health system – CDH-Delnor Health System.

### Dave Scalzo (Class of 1987)



On June 23, 2009, St. Michael School alumnus **Dan Proft** (Class of 1986) announced his candidacy for Governor of the State of Illinois.

During a campaign stop at the school, Dan spoke with gratitude of his educational experience at St. Michael. An experience which Proft said, “provided foundation as well as direction. Your spirituality plays a large part in forming your worldview. Faith, as well as opportunities to both serve and lead, were integrated into a rigorous curriculum.”

“I remember how tough the teachers were. Failure was a concept, but not really an option ... I think the measure of the quality of an education is summed up in the William Butler Yeats quote, ‘Education is not the filling of a pail. It is the lighting of a fire.’ And that’s what happened at St. Michael, we were engaged at a young age ... it was instilled that our success was bigger than us.’ ”



To which his Chief of Staff, **Dave Scalzo** added (Class of 1987), “Dan and I were taught that every person is given unique gifts and talents and that we have a responsibility to use those gifts and talents to better our world and the situations of others.”

Upon learning of her former student’s candidacy, Gloria Martin sent Dan a note saying, she was “very surprised and proud of you. I can still picture you in my third grade class at St. Michael and somehow knew that that boy would be somebody. You were always a perfectionist and I am sure that that piece of talent helped you achieve the goals you’ve

set for yourself. May God bless you and help you on the road to the Governorship. I will be keeping you in my prayers.”

Peggy Flynn, who taught Proft and Scalzo in junior high, remembers both as being very bright. “They both won awards for the Science Fair in 1986. Dan was very friendly and outspoken. Dave was outgoing and very well-liked.”

From his beginnings at St. Michael, Proft graduated from Benet Academy, Northwestern University and Loyola University School of Law. For the past 15 years, he has slugged it out in the political arena, working for Lee Daniels and other state and local government offices.

He is a small business owner, running his own public affairs company, but he is most widely-known as co-host of The Bruce Wolf & Dan Proft Show on WLS-AM, as well as a political commentator for Chicago’s morning radio program, The Don Wade and Roma Show.

Among his civic pursuits, Dan serves as a Board member for the Illinois Chapter of Operation Homefront, a nonprofit whose mission is to provide assistance to active duty military families, particularly those with a spouse serving overseas.

Adoption and life issues are close to Dan’s heart. As many of his classmates may know, Dan was adopted at birth by Larry and Carol Proft nine months before the Roe v. Wade decision. Dan has served on the Associate Board of The Cradle an Evanston-based adoption agency. He is also a volunteer for the Choose Life License Plate initiative, designed to fund adoption-services.

“St. Michael School has a long-held tradition of cultivating responsible servant-leaders through academic, spiritual, and social development,” said Principal Marcia Opal “We see our alumni contributing in many different arenas. St. Michael School alumni carry their light forward into a dark world. Politics aside, Dan is going forth in that way: to be a voice for what he believes is right. Dan’s mission is a credit to the legacy of St. Michael Parish School.”



### Michael Serio (Class of 1991)



"ONE LOVE." With these words, **Michael Serio** (Class of 1991) often ended conversations with his younger brother.

As **Kevin Serio** (Class of 1994) speaks about his brother Michael, who passed away at age 32 on January 24, 2009, his voice is low, steady and determined, never cracking, but drenched in layers of raw sorrow and nostalgia.

"The main thing I want people to remember about Michael was his philosophy that you can't live angry," said Kevin. "I think St. Michael's instilled that ... He never thought negatively about anybody ... He had a lot of struggles and bad things happen, but he always saw the good in life. He never did anything half way. Michael worked hard, played hard, loved his family and was always grateful for where he was."

In his eulogy, Michael's siblings recounted many stories of their brother. He is remembered by friends and family as someone who lived with passion, worked with intention and loved with his whole heart. By age 32, Michael had worked his way up to the position of Vice President at Santa Barbara Bank & Trust.

In their grief, the Serio family made the decision to gift memorial contributions to St. Michael School's tuition assistance fund, which helps families who have children currently attending the school and have financial difficulties that might jeopardize their children's enrollment in the school.

Michael's mother, Regina Carlson, said of the decision, "There is no place that established a more solid foundation in the education and faith of my six children than St. Michael. It was with the help of the Parish and such funds that they were all able to finish at St. Michael, so it was fitting that this is where donations would go. We received condolences from many past and present families and staff members from St. Michael along with many generous donations to this fund."

On May 31, 2009, the family held a Chicago Cubs game fundraiser held at the Lakeview Baseball Club to benefit the Michael Serio Foundation for tuition assistance at St. Michael School. The fundraiser, organized by Kevin Serio, successfully raised over \$3,000.00 for the students of St. Michael School.

"Michael is and will continue to be a hero to many of our students," said St. Michael School principal Marcia Opal. "The need [for tuition assistance] is great and growing – despite impressions to the contrary. The Serio family's gift to our school in Michael's name not only makes a St. Michael School education possible for individual families, but also ensures that a Catholic Education is available to all, not just the very wealthy. In this way, Michael's light will live on. We are tremendously grateful and humbled by the generosity of the Serio family."

"One Love," says Kevin. "Michael and I knew exactly what that meant. There is too much good in the world to let things like money, jealousy or relationships cause anger in any of us. Love everything the same ... share that ONE LOVE with everyone. Live like Michael did ... fully and at peace, with an abundance of love...enjoying every second because we don't know what God's plan is and we never know when it is time for us to go to Him. For someone that live a very short 32 years, Michael did more than most people do in 100 years."

"St. Michael School is deeply saddened by the untimely loss of one of our own," says Opal. "Personally, as a mother of two adult children, my heart aches for his family. They are all in our prayers."

The school is proud of the fact that through life's challenges and adversities Michael held onto key values instilled in him as a child. "We hope all of our alumni go forward from our school with the values that were instilled in them at St. Michael School, as Michael Serio seemed to – each in their own unique way," said Opal.

Hello, my name is Elena Zinski and I am a freshman at Benet Academy after nine years at St. Mike's.

I really don't know how to begin to explain how much my Catholic education has meant to me. I could tell you about the life-long friends I have made, or how easy my English class is this year, but in the grand scheme of things, those seem almost insignificant.
